Patient Safety in Perioperative Practice

Patient Safety: How lessons learned in theatre can be transferred to the ward

Following a series of never events in a District General Hospital the CQC required the Trust to improve surgical care services. Incidents related to invasive procedures (IPs) in medicine led to the development of Local Safety Standards (LocSSIPs) for ward based invasive procedures in

acute medicine.

The ward environment is rarely as sterile, predictable or controllable as theatres so a multimodal approach overhauled six key domains including documentation, governance, education and peri-procedural safety checklists. To support this risk management system an annual audit of LocSSIPs compliance was established reporting to departmental governance for ongoing development and learning.

In the 12 months since the introduction of these processes there have been no patient safety incidents relating to IPs within acute medicine and the inaugural 12-month audit showed a 93% compliance to the new system. Established theatre safety culture has been effectively transferred to a medical ward environment improving patient safety throughout the hospital.

Over half of surgical procedures today are performed on persons aged 65 and older. To achieve optimal patient outcomes, collaboration between surgical and geriatric medicine specialists is needed.

To advance this dialogue, the April 2022 issue JAMDA – the Journal of Post-Acute and Long-Term Care Medicine – is entirely devoted to Surgery in Older Persons: Challenges, Considerations, and

Interdisciplinary Management. Its 28 research papers address a wide range of subjects, including estimation of surgical risk; formal surgical-medical partnerships around perioperative care and rehabilitation; conditions such as hip fracture, inguinal hernia, and traumatic brain injury in older persons; new techniques such as robot-assisted surgery; and potential adverse outcomes such as delirium and long-term cognitive decline.

CCG8: Supporting patients to drink, eat and mobilise after surgery

Description	Ensuring that 70% of surgical inpatients are supported to drink, eat and mobilise within 24 hours of surgery ending.	
Numerator	Of the denominator, admissions where, within 24 hours of surgery ending, the patient was supported to drink, eat and mobilise by the following actions being taken: Documented order and provision of the patient with free fluids Documented order and provision of food, which may include oral soft nutrition or any other food Documented order and provision of assistance to support an awake patient to mobilise from bed to chair	
Denominator	Total elective inpatient admissions with a primary procedure in the following groups: colorectal resection, cystectomy, nephrectomy, hysterectomy, primary hip replacement, primary knee replacement, revision hip replacement, revision knee replacement and liver resection. See supporting coding guidance for OPCS codes.	
Exclusions	Admissions where the patient was sedated for the 24h after surgery ended.	
Data reporting and performance	Quarterly submission via National CQUIN collection. See the section on Understanding Performance (above) for details about auditing as well as data collection and reporting. Data will be made available approximately six weeks after each quarter. Performance basis: Quarterly.

"Greener Operations" James Lind Alliance Priority Setting Partnership Interim Survey

Did you know that healthcare is responsible for around 5% of the UK's carbon footprint?

CPOC is supporting "Greener Operations", a James Lind Alliance Priority Setting Partnership which aims to identify the most important research questions that need to be answered in order to help make operations (including surgery, anaesthesia, and healthcare provided around the time of an operation) more environmentally sustainable.


Last year an initial survey generated over 1,500 potential research questions about environmentally sustainable perioperative care. Since then, the Greener Operations team has

reviewed the suggestions, checked them against existing research, and developed 60 'indicative questions' which represent the themes of the suggestions from the initial survey.

Greener Operations is now inviting patients, carers, members of the public and clinicians to indicate which of the indicative questions they think are most important via an <u>online survey</u>. This will be used to produce a shortlist of questions which will be discussed in-depth at the final priority setting workshop in London on 15th June. The final output will be a 'top ten' list of research questions in environmentally sustainable perioperative care.

The survey is open now and will close at 12:00 midday on 30th May 2022.
